Welcome to Malaysia!

A beautiful country -located in the Southeast Asia & just south of Thailand on the Malay Peninsula, Malaysia is a tropical paradise in the heart of southeast Asia. It's perhaps best known for many nice beaches, rainforests, the wealth of natural beauty and impressive scenery. The capital, **Kuala Lumpur** houses the tallest twin towers in the world, while its islands are home to some of the most beautiful dive areas you can



see. Whether you're up for trekking and diving, or just want to relax on the beach and dine in the city, Malaysia is certainly worth a visit.

PLANNING YOUR TRIP TO MALAYSIA

WHAT IS THE WEATHER LIKE IN MALAYSIA FOR ALL YEAR ROUND?

Malaysia's climate is **equatorial** that is **hot**, **humid** and **rainy** throughout the year.

🌞 Summer Season in Malaysia

The summers in Malaysia are from March to October. It is the best time to visit Malaysia in its eastern part which remains drier during this time of the year. The west coast of Malaysia including places like Penang, Langkawi, and Pangkor experience rainy season from April to October. March is the hottest month in Malaysia with a temperature rising up to 28°C, while the weather from April to October is also comparatively warmer as compared to the other months of the year. One must carry light clothes to Malaysia during this time, to stay cool.

🐆 Monsoon Season in Malaysia

Malaysia has two monsoons- one on the eastern side, while the other on the western side. The monsoon season is not the best time to visit Malaysia, because many adventure activities and water sports are restricted during this season. However, one can visit the eastern side when there are rains on the western side and vice versa. Thus, when to visit Malaysia is not a question to worry about as one can have fun in Malaysia at any time of the year. One must take an idea of the weather conditions before visiting the country, and pack accordingly.

Thus, different seasons of Malaysia cannot be differentiated from one another because Malaysia has an even climate throughout the year, but the best time to visit Malaysia depends on the place one wants to visit in the country. For the eastern areas, the best time to visit is from April to October, while for the western areas, the best time to visit is from December to February.

Winter Season in Malaysia

The best time to visit Malaysia in winters is from December to January to enjoy festivals like New Year, Christmas, and others with friends and family. One also gets to see the Chinese New Year celebration which is a 15 days festival in Malaysia. The winters in Malaysia fall from November to February, and January is the coldest month. During winters, the days are generally cool with a





light breeze, while the nights are chilly. One must pack a light jacket for the nights. During winter months, the eastern part of Malaysia experiences heavy rainfall, and therefore, visiting the western part is preferred.

IN AREAS:

Lowlands & Highlands (places include Kuala Lumpur, Malacca and Cameron Highlands)

Hot and humid throughout the year, Kuala Lumpur and Malacca experience showers that occur almost daily. However, the highlands have a very different climate from the rest of Malaysia. The temperatures average a very pleasant 22 °C in the daytime and a relatively cool 15 °C at night with heavy rainfall between September and early December, the highlands are definitely an excellent location for growing tea, flowers, and fruits.

West Coast (places include Langkawi, Penang and Pangkor)


The west coast mainland and islands off Peninsular Malaysia enjoy the typical tropical climate --- hot, sunny, and humid with showers all year round. The downpours are heavier during September and October.

East Coast (places include Kuantan, Tioman Island, Perhentian Islands, Terengganu, Redang and Kota Bharu)

The east coast of Malaysia is well known for its hot and sunny weather for much of the year with the warm waters of the South China Sea. However, tourists are advised to avoid visiting the islands during the North-East Monsoon that strikes between November and February. That is because the showers are heavier and they can disrupt boat crossings and safety. Outside of the North-East Monsoon months, the east coast is usually drier than the rest of Malaysia.

WHEN IS THE BEST TIMES TO VISIT MALAYSIA?

The best times to visit Malaysia are as:





East Coast (included: **Kuantan, Tioman Island, Perhentian Islands, Terengganu, Redang and Kota Bharu**), from **April to October** is the **best time**, when the weather is at its driest.

IMPORTANT NOCES BEFORE YOU TRAVEL TO MALAYSIA

Check Visa & Passport Requirements

Check if you need a visa before travelling to Malaysia. The visa requirements are different for many countries; some nationalities do not need visas for a stay less than 30 days, some nationalities can obtain e-visa to Malaysia online and some need to get visa to Malaysia in advance a Malaysian Representative Office in his country of residence. **Always check the visa requirements for your country** to make sure you are allowed to enter Malaysia!





Make sure your passport is valid at least 6 months from the arrival date to Malaysia to avoid trouble!

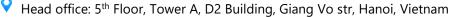

Purchase Travel Insurance

are taking part in more extreme activities like riding motorbikes, hiking mountains, cliff-jumping, and doing water sports. Consult Your Doctor

WHEN YOU ARE IN MALAYSIA

Currencies

The **official currency in Malaysia is Ringgit** with the code MYR and symbol as: "RM". Ringgit have banknotes worth RM100, RM50, RM20, RM10, RM5, RM1 and 50 sen (cent) coins, as well as 20 sen, 10 sen, and 5 sen coins, exchange rates here: https://www.bnm.gov.my/latest-rates

Where are the Best Places to Exchange Money in Malaysia?

There is no limit on the amount of foreign currency that people can bring in and out of Malaysia. However, the amount of Ringgit is limited to the equivalent of US\$10,000.

DRESS RESPECTFULLY

When entering temples, you have to abide by the dress code. In addition to removing your shoes, you have to wear clothes that cover your knees, shoulders, chest and stomach.

RESPECT THEIR WAY OF LIFE BY COVERING UP A BIT MORE.

You are perfectly fine wearing shorts and T-shirts when it is hot out, just try to hide areas like cleavage and the midriff so you seem a bit more aware of the Malaysian modesty.

ASK BEFORE PHOTOGRAPHING PEOPLE

Before taking a photo of someone, ask for their permission. If you see a local wearing a traditional garment or a monk praying in a temple, this can be a beautiful image to capture. Malaysians are usually very friendly, so if you ask for a photo they will most likely oblige. If you need more help with this, check out our guide to travel photography tips for beginners.

AVOID TOUCHING OTHER PEOPLE'S HEADS





The head is considered the holiest part of the body, so you should never touch someone's head. It seems unlikely that you would touch someone's head anyway, but just be aware that it is seen as disrespectful so try to avoid that.

BARGAIN WITH DIGNITY

Bargaining for goods at street markets is a huge part of travelling to Malaysia. Definitely give it a try, but always be respectful and don't bargain too low. See what the original price is, and slowly try and lower the cost. Generally speaking, half of the original price is as low as you should go. Anything lower than that may offend the vendor.

If you are buying something handmade or truly unique and special, just pay the full price as your money will benefit the local artist and community.

BUDGET TRAVEL TIPS FOR MALAYSIA

Tipping is NOT customary in Malaysia, there is absolutely NO mandatory requirement to tip anyone, but small gratuities for great service are very much appreciated.

InAsiaTrips Travel & DMC just give you an idea of most common tips as below:

HOTELS IN MALAYSIA, TIPPING IS NOT REQUIRED

Tipping is not required, and a service charge is usually included in the price. You can tip RM 2-10 per bag to the porter, RM 2-10 for room service and RM 2-10 per day for the housekeeper, if you want. However, this is not expected, nor required. Some hotels, mostly higher end, will encourage tipping for the porter (bellhop) and for room service.

RESTAURANTS IN MALAYSIA – DON'T TIP

At most restaurants, tipping is not required and will not be expected. A 10% service charge will normally added to the bill and many locals round-up the bill and leave the change.

SPAS IN MALAYSIA - DON'T TIP

You are not expected to tip at spas in Malaysia. Some hotels add a 'spa charge'.

FOR TOUR GUIDE? - TIP 20RM - 30RM PER PERSON PER DAY

A private tour guide should receive RM 20 – 30 per day, per person. You aren't expected to tip a group tour guide, but you can tip 10% of the price if you want.

FOR TAXI DRIVER? - DON'T TIP

In Malaysia it is not required or expected to tip your taxi driver. However, if you hire the driver for a few days, it may be nice to tip RM 25-50.

FIND THE CHEAPEST FORM OF TRANSPORTATION

Compare different forms of transportation to find the cheapest option. Malaysia has an extensive network of travel options. For travelling short distances you can take a tuk-tuk, rent a motorbike, or hop into a songtaew (red pickup trucks that serve as shared taxis).

For travelling long distances, you can take buses, minivans, trains, or planes.

One transport option isn't always cheaper than the others, so ask around, do some research, and try to find the cheapest option before you travel.





DON'T DRINK THE TAP WATER

The tap water is not safe for drinking in Malaysia. Bring a reusable water bottle that you can refill at drinking water stations, or bring your own filter so you can always have clean water. You can buy bottled water during your trip to Malaysia, but try to reduce your plastic waste whenever possible!

USE SUN PROTECTION

Always wear sunscreen. Whether you are on the beach, in the city or in the mountains, whether it is sunny or cloudy, just wear sunscreen to be safe. The sun is so strong in Malaysia, so you are always at risk of burning, no matter what skin type you have. You may want to bring your own sunscreen from home, as the prices are quite expensive in Malaysia. Also, wear sunglasses and a hat whenever possible.

AVOID PETTY THEFT

- ✓ Be alert and aware of pick pocketing and bag-snatching, as petty crime is rampant in Malaysia.
- ✓ Avoid secluded places at night.
- ✓ Do not carry big amounts of cash with you at public places.

INTERNET

Internet cafés and shops can be found in all Malaysian cities and large towns, often in malls or in upstairs premises along central streets, and most backpacker guesthouses have free wi-fi connections. While many serve the odd coffee or coke, the emphasis often isn't on beverages or even getting online, but on networked gaming, the terminals swamped by kids playing noisy shoot-em-ups late into the night. Periodic crackdowns temporarily compel the internet cafés to keep sensible hours and, it's hoped, the youths in their beds. At least the cafés do provide reliable internet access, costing RM3-6 per hour in practically all cases.

BE SAFE ON THE ROAD

Drivers in Malaysia can be insane to say the least. Sometimes road traffic doesn't seem to have any rhyme or reason, and some locals drive super-fast. You'll see about 10 people on motorbikes in one lane, all packed close together and whipping around corners. It is a bit scary, so always pick bus companies that are reputable so you know you are safe on the road. If you plan on driving in Malaysia, either in a rental car or on a motorbike, be very careful at all times!


